Knows sub-fields of psychology, can explain the differences and limitations with other branches 2 Interpret the basic theories and principles in the field of psychology. 3 Have the ability to identify, define, formulate and solve basic problems related to people's mental and emotional processes and behavior. 4 Gains the ability to work competently in individual and social events. 5 Understands the development process of a living thing and can develop ideas. 6 Be able to conduct, develop, analyze and apply scientific research in the field of psychology. 7 Respects individual (such as age, gender, ethnic identity, religion and sexual orientation) and cultural differences and can approach without prejudi 8 As a graduate of the psychology department, he owns his profession and understands the limitations of his profession. 9 Understands the ethical rules of the psychology profession and acts in accordance with the ethical rules. 10 It is involved in research in the field of psychology and mental health 11 Follows current events, can evaluate these events from a psychological point of view **Program Outputs** COURSE DESCRIPTIONS Course Descriptions – I: All Area Core and Faculty/School Core courses offered by the department of the program. Credit Credit Key concepts of philosophy, problems and questions, the connections between philosophy and other disciplines, philosophers' views throughout history, existential philosophy, philosophy of art, knowledge, and ethics will be covered in addition to the similarities and differences between science, politics and religion. This course will start from Ancient Greece and examine the historical developments of psychology and has been designed to offer a perspective on the practices in psychology. The history of the mind and ideas and key historical developments are the primary topics in this course. Also, the course will examine how psychology came to be and how the philosophical schools had an influence on the field. Psychological approaches from various ages will be examined. Content CULTURAL AND CROSSCULTURAL PSYCHOLOGY The goal of this course is to examine the effects of culture in various areas of psychology, especially in clinical psychology. This course will analyze how factors like culture, ethnicity, and gender influence personality, emotions, intelligence, and psychological problem experiences as well as their expressions. In this course, the effects of culture on the subfields of psychology, especially the effects in clinical psychology will be examined. Experiences among disadvantaged groups and influences on mental health will be discussed. As per the scope of cultural psychology, culture and cognitive processes, culture and emotion, culture and human development, language and human development, culture and self, and from a cultural psychology perspective, the problems of a liberal society will be discussed. Content INTRODUCTION TO PSYCHOLOGY-I (3, 0, 0)**3** This course will provide an understanding of what psychology is, the scope it covers, and its importance of psychology in the academic, professional, social and personal framework. The developmental history of psychology will be covered in addition to how research in psychology was and is done today. Subfields of psychology like social, clinical, educational, and political will also be explored. Also the psychoanalytic, psychodynamic, behavioral, cognitive behavioral and humanistic schools of psychology will be examined. Understanding human behavior is extremely important and to do this, we need to have an understanding of how or mind and brain function. The biological bases of behavior and topics like sensation and perception, personality, memory, abnormal behavior and intelligence will be covered. Content RESEARCH METHODS IN PSYCHOLOGY (3, 0, 0)**3** Research methods in psychology, differentiating between scientific and non-scientific publications, critically evaluate scientific studies, understanding the basic principles of research design, correlational or experimental studies' hypothesis testing, data collection methods (observation and interviewing techniques, review studies, surveys and inventories), psychometric properties of instruments (reliability and validity), data analysis and interpretation and writing up the findings in APA style as well as ethics in research are among the topics to be covered in class. In addition to this, students will learn how to conduct a literature search in psychology, how to reach appropriate sources, recognize the library system, and how to use electronic databases. Also, topics like preparing an academic assignment, report writing, citing, and academic honesty will also be covered.

In this course, students will learn about how research in sexuality is done, by whom, and their findings along with pioneers in the field. Students will be taught sexual anatomy, the sexual response cycle, the physiology involved in the sexual response cycle (hormones, neurological basis) and the psychology associated with sexuality (relationships, emotions, past experiences, etc.) Also clinically diagnosed sexual disorders and dysfunctions will be examined with treatment modalities. In addition, contraception, pregnancies, sexually transmitted diseases and sexual orientation are among the topics that will be covered in class. Course Content During their senior year, students wanting to conduct research in any field of psychology, under the supervision of a faculty member, will be able to do a literature search, collect data, organize, analyze, and report the findings using qualitative methods. This course will cover an introduction to qualitative research, the ten principles of qualitative research, and planning and designing the study. In addition, interviews and focus groups will be examined as part of interactional data collection. Surveys, stories, journals, and textual secondary sources will be introduced. Preparation for verbal data and different qualitative methods will be examined. Also, the first steps of qualitative analysis – recognition, coding, identifying patters throughout data - analyzing, interpreting and reporting the findings will be emphasized. Course Content ATTLING ADDICTIONS (3, 0, 0)**3** Englis Throughout this course, students will learn the definition of addictions, the types of addictions, how to communicate with persons suffering from addictions, understand the theoretical components underlying addictions, the negative aspects of addictions, and how to deal with addictions. In addition to key concepts and definitions, addictions types (substance, technology, etc.) the causes for addictions, factors leading to addictions like family, peers, and societal risk factors will be examined. Also children and adolescent addictions, adult addictions and communication styles will be analyzed. The role of social work, models dealing with addiction, addiction prevention, consequences, national policies and strategies for prevention and treatment will be addressed. Course Content YC371 PSYCHOLOGY OF GENDER English This course is designed to examine the psycho-social development, gender roles and associated concepts, theories and models, prescribed gender roles, fixed judgments, research and inventories, education and gender, developments in gender equality, and the psychological counseling system regarding gender issues. The aim of this course is to help students gain an understanding in gender roles, sexual identity, identity construction and related issues. Also in this course, students will acknowledge how the media plays a role in constructing the notion of gender. One of the most important factors in the construction of gender roles is ethnicity, race, class, religion, nation, and sexuality and examine their crossing points while emphasizing the importance of their media representations in our life. Course Content English This course aims to provide students with in-depth research and presentation skills on a specific psychology topic. In the seminar course, students will learn about current psychological theories, practices and research, while also developing their critical thinking skills. Each student will conduct comprehensive research on a topic of their choice, present their results in front of a group and participate in a discussion. The seminars provide students with the opportunity to develop professional communication skills, reinforce their academic writing skills and follow current developments in their field. In addition, this course will contribute to the acquisition of important skills such as collaboration and teamwork Content Students will write a thesis under the supervision of faculty advisor and include a literature review, data collection, analysis, results and discussion sections for the field they intend to work within. During this process, students will collaboratively generate a scientific publication with their faculty member of choice. This way, students will have the opportunity to gain research experience with a faculty member. Also, students will learn how to complete an ethics committee application prior to conducting their research. In addition, students will search for appropriate journals to send their work for publication and organize their paper according to the journal's author information. Research conducted in this course can be either quantitative, qualitative, or mixed methods. Content (3, 0, 0)**3** This course is designed to teach students the foundation principles of group therapy, how group psychotherapy is managed combined with psychodrama techniques and theoretical knowledge and with this information students are expected to organize and lead a group where they will display group psychotherapeutic skills. In addition, the definition of group psychotherapy, its components, types of groups, factors leading to treatment, concepts associated with group psychotherapy, interpersonal learning, group cohesion, ego unity, the role and function of the therapist, techniques, group psychotherapy training, transference and transparency are among the key topics that will be covered. Also, situations where group psychotherapy is used will be examined. In addition, 12 step programs, which also are widely used worldwide, will be analyzed. Content PORTS PSYCHOLOGY (3, 0, 0)**3** An introduction the field of sport psychology and its research areas, the basic concepts in the field, the psychological factors affecting the performance, motivation, group and team relationships, sensation and perception, competition, feedback, and the factors affecting concentration. This course will cover what sports psychology is, why it developed, its areas of interest, personality and sports, motivation, motivational theories, attention and concentration in sports, mental training in sports, sensation and sports performance, competition anxiety, sports injuries, and the psychological aspects of rehabilitation will be covered. Also the psychosocial aspects of childhood sports and the role of the sports psychologist will also be examined. Increasing sports performance, increasing the speed of learning or removing performance barriers as functions of sports psychology will be analyzed.
