ILAW106	LEGAL RESEARCH AND WRITING-II	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	In this course, students will receive instruction and practical experience in reading judicial decisions; both reported and unreported, legislation and subsidiary legislation. Contents: Introduction to Legal Research and Writing; Writing Legal Essays – Academic Writing. Drafting, Referencing and Submission; Cases - Reading, Publishing, Citation, Title and Briefs; Interpreting and Analysing Statutes; Law and the Courts - Civil and Criminal System; Forms of Legal Reasoning; Negotiation; Mediation; Advocacy; Mooting; And Developing a Transmittal Letter and A Client Opinion Letter.						
ILAW201	CRIMINAL LAW AND PROCEDURES - I	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	The course is an introductory lecture into the English criminal justice system. It is designed to show not only how the current law defines criminal behaviour, but also how people and organisations working in criminal justice use and interpret that law in the approaches they take to responding to crime in practice. Some of the topics to be considered are the following: (i) General principles of criminal liability: actus reus and mens rea, omissions, causation, negligence, strict liability, complicity and inchoate offences. (ii) General defences. (iii) The law relating to offences against the person such as sexual offences and offences against property and other economic interests, unlawful homicide; non-fatal offences against the person and offences against public order.						
ILAW203	CONTRACT LAW	(3, 0, 0)3	4	AC	-	English	
Course Content	First part of the course aims to introduce the basic principles of contract law, including the creation, modification and termination of contract rights obligations, the roles of reliance and restitution, capacity, conditions, third party rights and duties, and the effect of changed circumstances or mistake. Performance and breach of contractual obligations and remedies for breach will be also examined in details where students will also be taught to learn how to apply their knowledge into hypothetical situations and create advice.						
ILAW205	EUROPEAN LAW - I	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	For the most part of the course, it covers subjects such as the aims and policies of the European Union, the sources and supremacy of EU law, its direct effect before national courts and its impact on domestic legal rules, procedures and remedies, including the principle of State Liability for breach of EU Law. The court of final recourse in matters of EU law is the Court of Justice of the European Union. It has jurisdiction, e.g., to give preliminary rulings on references from national courts, and to review the legality of EU legislation.						
ILAW202	CRIMINAL LAW AND PROCEDURES - II	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	This second part of the course aims to focus on the procedural nature of the English legal system. Objects of procedure; detection of crime and arrest; the criminal courts; a prosecution; summary trial; key elements of case proceeding to the crown court for trial will be expounded upon, matters worth mentioning are criminal procedural rights, adversarial and inquisitorial systems, arguments on the admissibility and exclusion of criminal evidence, legal assistance, right to silence and freedom from self incrimination, due process and crime control model just to mention a few; case adjournments; bail and sentencing; the crown court; the youth court; appeal procedure.						
ILAW204	TORT LAW	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	During this part of the course, students will be introduced with the second part of the law of obligations which focuses on the law of tort. A tort consists of a wrongful acts or injury that lead to physical, emotional, or financial damage to a person in which another person could be held legally responsible. The two main subcategories of tort law are intentional torts and unintentional torts. The area specifically explores civil claims for a variety of intentional harms and offenses to people and property, negligent harms and						

	intentional torts and unintentional torts. The area specifically explores strict liability for a variety of intentional torts and extends to people and property, negligent torts and theories of strict liability (including products liability).

ILAW206	EUROPEAN LAW - II	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	This second part of the European Law aims to provide a comprehensive outlook at the European Union Common Market: The Four Freedoms: Common Market; Free Movement of Goods-costumes duties and internal taxation; quantitative restrictions; Free movement of Persons; freedom of establishment and services; free movement of capital. The nature of the common policies; social policy; competition policy and european citizenship: rights and duties, membership and participation. Mechanisms instituted by the union for the enforcement of EU law in the advent of infringement and an overview of the European Union judicial review will culminate the course.						
ILAW208	FAMILY LAW	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	The formation and breakdown of family relationships, the resolution of disputes, paternity, adoption, and children's rights are all covered under family law. This course examines key themes in the context of their historical, social, economic, and theoretical contexts. What is the purpose of the consanguinity limitations on marriage, for example, and should they be extended to civil partnerships as well? What does it mean to state that a kid has rights? Is there no such thing as 'children's rights' if we can't provide a cohesive account? Why do so many people believe in the fiction of the "common law marriage"? Should the courts and Parliament be concerned that these people believe they have legal rights and responsibilities when they don't? Among other things.						
ILAW301	COMMERCIAL LAW - I	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	The course aims to focus on the basic principles and foundations of the commercial law, namely; theoretical foundations; contractual interpretation; good faith; topics in the law of agency; personal property law; bailment; introduction to the sale of goods and services along with court procedures that need to be taken if an issue arises among commercial matters. Students will also be taught about branches of commercial law deal with business and financial transactions. They mainly include contract law, property law, corporate law, intellectual property law, tax law, negotiable instrument law, and uniform commercial code.						
ILAW303	EQUITY AND TRUST - I	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	This course module brings essential understanding to the classification of trusts and the requirements for validity of an express private trust; Express Private Trusts: the requirement of certainty; the formal requirements; the requirement for the trust to be validly constituted; the requirement for the trust to take effect within the relevant perpetuity period; the requirement for the trust to satisfy the beneficiary principle; Implied Trusts: resulting trusts; constructive trusts Express Public Trusts: charitable trusts. Duties and powers of trustees/ rights of beneficiaries; duty of investment and powers to invest; power to maintain and to advance; other duties and powers. Rights of Beneficiaries: right to seek variation of the trust; right to sue trustees for breach of trust- the personal claim; right to sue accessories to breach of trust -the personal claim; right to trace trust property- the propriety claim; Trust administration: outline of relevant tax law rules.						
ILAW305	EVIDENCE AND CIVIL PROCEDURES - I	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	The Law of Evidence I provides an introductory insight into the common law civil system. It covers the general principles in the operation of the English civil procedure which include the following; pre-action conduct of litigation; debt recovery actions; limitation; issue and service proceedings; defendant's response; default, and summary judgments; statements of case; parties; interim applications; case management. Evidence law evaluates on the use of testimony; oral or written declarations, such as an affidavit, exhibits such as physical items, documented material, or demonstrative evidence that are admissible (trier of fact, such as jury) in a judicial or administrative action.						
ILAW307	PROPERTY LAW	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	The goal of this course is to give students a broad introduction of personal property law, with a special emphasis on underlying principles and a thorough investigation of those topics. The course also intends to improve students' comprehension of key concepts found in the core topics of Land Law and Trusts: students will be reintroduced to and, more crucially, urged to re-examine notions like the nature of ownership and the necessity for transactional security. In a world where the intellectual property sector now accounts for a significant share of the global economy. And the most contentious issues in intellectual property law are inextricably linked to changes in the arts and technology, as well as marketing and popular culture. As a result, students from a wide range of backgrounds and interests will benefit from the course. Because intellectual property law in the United Kingdom is becoming increasingly Europeanized, we must study the European tools and case law that influence UK law.						
ILAW302	COMMERCIAL LAW - II	(3, 0, 0)3	6	AC	-	English	
Course Content	This second part of the course aims to focus on the problems in domestic sales such as passing of property and risk; problems in domestic sales, namely; remedies; international sale of goods, CIF and FOB contracts; financing of international trade. The course will also survey the law and policy of modern international trade agreements, with an emphasis on the treaty network of the World Trade Organization (WTO) and other important multilateral arrangements entered into with the rest of the world.						
ILAW304	EQUITY AND TRUST - II	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	This course module brings essential understanding to the duties and powers of trustees/ rights of beneficiaries; duty of investment and powers to invest; power to maintain and to advance; other duties and powers. Rights of Beneficiaries: right to seek variation of the trust; right to sue trustees for breach of trust- the personal claim; right to sue accessories to breach of trust -the personal claim; right to trace trust property- the propriety claim; Trust administration: outline of relevant tax law rules.						
ILAW306	EVIDENCE AND CIVIL PROCEDURES - II	(3, 0, 0)3	5	AC	-	English	
Course Content	It is therefore this course objective to introduce students to the fundamental principles of the law of evidence as applied under English Civil law. In referring to appropriate legislation and case law, the course considers such principles as relevance, credibility, tendency, and coincidence evidence, and the exceptions to the hearsay rule. Civil procedure is the study of the rules of court that must be followed by the judge and parties in civil cases (as opposed to criminal cases – the criminal procedure is a whole other area of the law. Small claims track; fast track; multi-track; disclosure; witness and expert evidence; offers and payments; trial and appeal; costs; matters arising after judgment.						
ILAW308	LAND LAW	(3, 0, 0)3	4	AC	-	English	
Course Content	This course introduces students the types of property rights in land; proving title and tenures and estates; legal and equitable rights in land and the 1925 legislation; the creation of equitable interests; the equitable doctrine of notice; registration of land charges (unregistered land); registration of title (registered land); requirements for a lease; obligation in leases; overview / revision. Old -style and new-style trusts of land; the operation of new-style trusts of land; co-ownership; adverse possession and easements; restrictive covenants; mortgages						
ILAW401	COMPANY LAW - I	(3, 0, 0)3	6	AC	-	English	
Course Content	The course aims to focus on the concept and basic principles of a company including functions of companies and the company law; comparison of companies, partnerships and sole traders; legal personality and limited liability; classification into public and private companies; memorandum and articles of association; agency problems. In this part, students specifically focus to learn how the law regulates corporations, investors, shareholders, directors, employees, creditors, and other stakeholders such as consumers, the community, and the environment interact with one another.						

ILAW403	PUBLIC INTERNATIONAL LAW - I	(3, 0, 0)3	6	AC	-	English
Course Content	The aim of the course is to introduce the main areas of public international law together with the basic knowledge of general international law. Gaining general knowledge in different fields of international law helps students to gain ability to access international law resources through research studies; It is among the objectives of the courses to bring the acquired knowledge to a functionally usable level. As the course method, the method of consolidating the knowledge with research, discussion and application studies was preferred.

Course Content	Case study; sale of Goods Act 1979 s.13 - correspondence with description; relationship between s.13 and express terms/representation; Sale of Goods Act s.14(2) as amended by the Sale and Supply of Goods Act 1994; Merchantable/ satisfactory quality Sale of Goods Act s.14(3) -fitness for purpose; Consumer remedies; acceptance of goods; damages; exclusion clauses; privacy; collateral contracts; manufacturer's guarantees; negligence; consumer protection Act; Consumers, consumerism and consumer law; evolution and theories of consumer law- modern and post modernism; advertising control- criminal law: trade description; civil liability; advertising standards authority; nature of advertising -law and discourse.					
ILAW402	COMPANY LAW - II	(3, 0, 0)3	6	AC	-	English
Course Content	During this part of the course, students will learn about the management of companies; directors' duties; transactions involving directors; issue of shares; payment for shares; dividends; rights of shareholders; derivative claims; just and equitable winding up and unfair prejudice orders. Students also will have the chance to revise their basic knowledge on company law once again within the context of this course. They have the chance to work on hypothetical cases in order to be able to learn more about how to apply their knowledge in such specific situations.					
ILAW404	PUBLIC INTERNATIONAL LAW - II	(3, 0, 0)3	6	AC	-	English
Course Content	This programme builds on principles of law studied in the first part of the course, topics to be covered are as follows; the nature Part two of this course would focus on topics such as; the concept of sovereignty and state recognition; state jurisdiction; the acquisition and loss of territory; state responsibility; treaties and other international legal agreements; the pacific settlement of disputes; the use of force; international institutions; human rights, State responsibility, the use of force and the procedures for peaceful settlement of disputes. In addition, the lectures introduce students to selected special subject areas such the law of the sea, international humanitarian law and investment arbitration.					
ILAW408	INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL LAW	(3, 0, 0)3	6	AC	-	English
Course Content	The course "International Criminal Law" deals with the issues of contemporary international criminal law and procedure. It comprises the topics on the sources of the international criminal law, criminal jurisdiction of states and immunities, mutual legal assistance in criminal matters and extradition, international criminal justice, individual criminal responsibility for genocide, crimes against humanity, war crimes and the crime of aggression. A special emphasis is made on the use of Socratic method, case studies and combination of individual and collective exercises.

Course Content	The course covers the fundamental theories and concepts of macroeconomics such as gross domestic product, aggregate expenditure and aggregate income, economic wellbeing, unemployment and its outcomes, economic growth and development, potential gross domestic product, finance, saving and investment, governmental regulation of the financial market, money and their functions, economic functions of banks, banking system, inflation, how the quantity of money influences the price level and the inflation rate, exchange rate, interest rate parity, purchasing power parity, alternative exchange rate policies and their effects, the balance of payments accounts, international deficit.					
ACCT227	LEGAL ACCOUNTING	(3, 0, 0)3	6	AC	-	English
Course Content	The connection between trusts accounting and bookkeeping will be examined in the Legal Accounting course. The goal of the course is to develop a fundamental grasp of accounting concepts and their application to trust. In order to achieve this goal, the course focuses on teaching students the fundamental technical skills necessary to apply accounting principles and regulations and gain a knowledge of how economic events are documented in financial statements. It also emphasizes on the fundamentals of financial reporting and the function of the legal auditor. We will engage in several activities that will help with financial statement interpretation. This course places a strong emphasis on how decision-making about various accounting techniques, as well as accounting regulation, can affect the reported statistics

Later on, international regulations for environmental protection are going to be discussed; main subjects within this framework are the latest developments in European Union and international environmental law that dominate the law in question. Climate change and the economic and legal instruments used in combating climate change will be at the forefront of the topics to be discussed, and other issues within the scope of international environmental law such as nuclear energy, waste management, water and air pollution will also be discussed.

Course Content	This course examines a variety of legal, ethical, and medical challenges that arise in medical practice and research. It focuses on questions of consent, autonomy, and the patient's and other interested parties' best interests, as well as how they overlap with other fields of law, such as tort, criminal, and personal property law. Intentional torts and clinical negligence are discussed, as well as reproductive medicine and rights, organ donation and transplantation, and end-of-life problems. The lectures cover both the legal and ethical difficulties that arise in various fields of medicine, and they presume that students have already completed the Law Moderations Criminal Law course and the FHS Tort Law course.

The course will also follow advances in the United Kingdom's reform of human rights law, and its material will reflect changes in a rapidly changing field of law. The course will cover domestic UK law as well as relevant European Convention on Human Rights and other international human rights norms that directly pertain to UK human rights law.

Course Content	<p>The course begins with an introduction to international commercial contracts, the characteristics of contracts, the elements of contracts. Inter alia, international payment methods, international delivery methods, alternative dispute resolution methods, governing law, force majeure rule, insurance and settlement issues will be discussed. In addition to this, the students shall be aware of international transfer of goods, CISG rules, rules regarding the methods to be employed in case of conflict. They will also learn issues such as arbitration and institutional arbitration, ad hoc arbitration.
